
ATTAINMENT

Reading at LPGS



Why is it so important for our students to read?



"children between the ages of 10 and 16 who read for pleasure make more progress, not only in vocabulary and spelling but also in maths, than those who rarely read"

The relationship between reading age, education and life outcomes



are more likely to be unemployed.

tend to earn less and receive fewer training and promotion opportunities.

make less use of preventative health services and engage in more risky health behaviour.

POOR READERS:

experience more health issues and illness but are less likely to understand and manage their treatment.

are more likely to exhibit delinquent, antisocial behaviours and are more likely to offend.

experience lower life satisfaction and lower wellbeing.

Evidence from Clark & Rumbold, 2006 and Howard, 2011

11 years old is a key transition point



Poor readers at age 11 are found to have less selfbelief regarding their ability to succeed at a task, are more likely to give up, and show little resilience following failure (Butkowsky and Willows, 1980).

Pupils must reach approximately a reading age of 13, in order to understand the main ideas in a literature or science-based text (NAEP; NCES, 2006)

Create a routine


30 minutes a day aloud

Be patient!

What you can do at home:

Find books they enjoy

Ask them questions



What do you think is going to happen next and why?

Does the story remind you of anything you've read or seen before? In what ways?

What does the setting look like when you imagine it?

What do you think of the main character(s)?

How do you think you would have responded to this situation?

How would you have liked that part of the story to be different?

Why do you think the author wrote this book?

Did the book end how you thought it would? Would you have ended it differently?



Create a routine

30 minutes a day aloud







- Students will be using their planners to keep track of their:



Aims of the trip


- Learning to work together as a team

Accommodation

- Accommodation is in residential blocks
- Students placed in form groups by tutor
- Room size from 2-6
- Staff spread throughout all blocks
- Bedding included
- Senior staff members are on duty until 10:30pm each day with night staff patrolling between the hours of 10:30pm and 07:30am.
- LPGS Staff duty
- Centre doors are secured in the evening but can be opened in case of emergency and security barriers guard the entrance to the site.





Arrival and Departure



14th October

- Students wear trainers, leggings/trousers, t-shirt/jumper
- Students arrive at LPGS on Monday 14 October, and we depart at 12:30, arriving at Grosvenor Hall at 14:00

15th October

Activities all day

16th October

- Breakfast and morning activities
- Depart from Kingswood @13:00; arrive LPGS between 14:00-14:30

Security



- One member of LPGS staff will be in each activity group (groups of 10-15)
- Members of staff will be on night duty (in each block) should they be required
- Group leader will have 24-hour contact with Kingswood staff and all LPGS Senior Leadership Team
- 24-hour first aid is available from: Kingswood (day) LPGS first aider (night)
- The group leader will be contactable in case of emergency (Mrs Kourtaa)





Specialist Clothing

- The below activities have specific clothing requirements:

Medication

- All prescribed medication (antibiotics/daily medication etc.) must be named and handed in to reception on the morning (8:00am) with signed letter of consent and instructions (how much/time).
- There will be a small amount of Calpol/paracetamol/Piriton with staff.




